What, for example, are the characteristics of a courageous and compassionate leader? In the wake of a disaster, which leadership traits will be most important in helping others to persevere and come together?

Lieutenant General Russel L. Honoré (invited)

When hurricanes Katrina and Rita moved across the gulf coast of the United States in 2005, they left behind unprecedented devastation. After the storms passed, many communities - along with a number of public safety agencies - were found to be in ruins. In the process of helping bring order to chaos, General Russel L. Honoré was appointed to lead the Department of Defense response to Hurricanes Katrina and Rita in Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana. In his keynote address General Honoré will discuss the difficult issues that come to bear upon leaders in agencies that may, themselves, have been decimated.
