

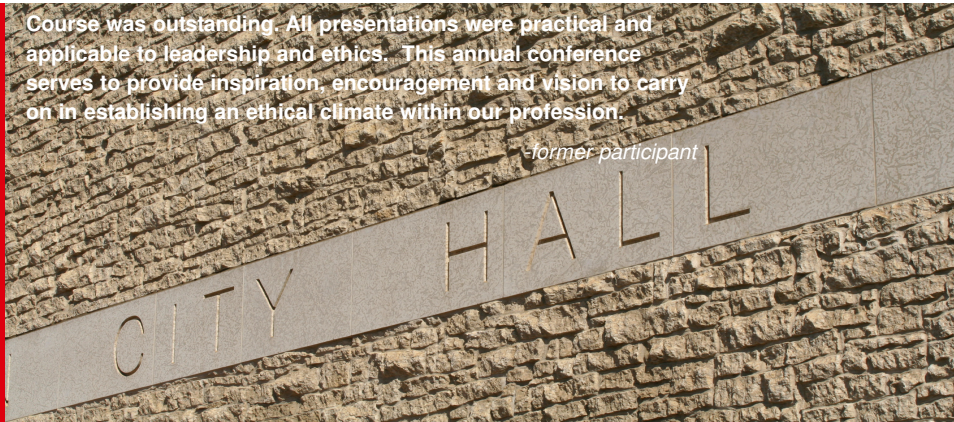

KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Terrance W. Gainer
Sergeant at Arms, United States Senate

On January 4, 2007, Terrance W. Gainer was sworn in as the 38th United States Senate Sergeant at Arms. His remarkable career spans decades of experience in public safety, including service as Chief of the United States Capitol Police.

Mr. Gainer began his law enforcement career as a police officer in Chicago, Illinois, in 1968, rising through the ranks as a homicide detective, sergeant, and executive assistant in the Administrative Services Bureau. An accomplished attorney admitted in Illinois, Federal District Court and U.S. Supreme Court, Mr. Gainer served as chief legal officer of the Chicago Police Department, where he assisted in negotiating the city's first labor contract with the police union.

Prior to his service as Chief of the United States Capitol Police, Mr. Gainer served in a number of leadership positions including Director of the Illinois State Police and Executive Assistant Chief of the Metropolitan Police Department in Washington, D.C.

Following a twenty-three year career in the Tulsa, OK, Police Department, Stanley Glanz was elected sheriff of Tulsa County in 1988. Re-elected in 1992, 1996, 2000 and 2004, Sheriff Glanz was named Sheriff of the Year in 2000 by the National Sheriff's Association. A member of the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, he has received the Bronze Eagle Feather Award from the Oklahoma Native American Law Enforcement Association. Sheriff Glanz holds a BS from the University of Tulsa, and a Masters in Criminal Justice Administration from Oklahoma City University.

Timothy Braaten, Executive Director Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and Education (TCLEOSE)

Over the course of a law enforcement career that commenced in 1968, Mr. Braaten has served as police chief in Oakridge, TN; Mequon, WI; and Victoria, TX. On January 1, 2006, he was appointed Executive Director of the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education. Mr. Braaten holds a Bachelor's Degree in psychology and sociology from Concordia College in Moorhead, MN, and a Master's Degree in public administration from Wayne State University in Detroit, MI.
