Superintendent Warren J. Riley New Orleans Police Department

On November 24, 2005, Warren J. Riley assumed command of the New Orleans, LA, Police Department. Prior to his appointment as Superintendent, he served as Deputy Superintendent (Chief Operations Officer), where he commanded all field and investigative units in the NOPD, consisting of 17 divisions and over 1,300 commissioned members. Superintendent Riley holds both a Bachelor of Science and a Master of Arts in Criminal Justice from Southern University in New Orleans, and has attended the Senior Management Institute for Police Executives at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government. A twenty-four year law enforcement veteran, Superintendent Riley is involved in a number of professional organizations including the Police Executive Research Forum, the International Association of Chiefs of Police, and the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives.

Ms. Cherie Castellano

Recognized as an international expert in the field of behavioral healthcare and crisis intervention for law enforcement professionals, Ms. Castellano is Program Director for Cop2 Cop, the first legislated law enforcement crisis hotline in the United States. A member of the faculty of the New Jersey Medical School Department of Psychiatry, she was assigned, following September 11, to coordinate a critical incident response to over 1,900 first responders in New York and New Jersey. Widely published in the fields of law enforcement, crisis intervention and disaster psychology, Ms. Castellano is co-author of "Psychological Counterterrorism and World War IV." KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Russel L. Honoré, Lieutenant General
United States Army, Fort Gillem, Georgia

A native of Lakeland, Louisiana, General Honoré was commissioned a Second Lieutenant of Infantry and awarded a Bachelor of Science degree in Vocational Agriculture upon graduation from Southern University and A&M College in 1971. He also holds a Master of Arts in Human Resources from Troy State University, and an Honorary Doctorate in Public Administration from Southern University and A&M College. General Honoré's many awards and decorations include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal, the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal, the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, the Global War on Terror Service Medal, the Korean Defense Service Medal and the Kuwait Liberation Medal.

When hurricanes Katrina and Rita moved across the gulf coast of the United States in 2005, they left behind unprecedented devastation. After the storms passed, many communities - along with a number of public safety agencies - were found to be in ruins. In the process of helping bring order to chaos, General Russel L. Honoré was appointed to lead the Department of Defense response to Hurricanes Katrina and Rita in Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana. In his keynote address General Honoré will discuss the difficult issues that come to bear upon leaders in agencies that may, themselves, have been decimated.
